


These presentations and discussions will focus on heritage, histories, and pottery production that flourished in the Edgefield District in the 19th Century. Our discussions will address the challenges to understanding the complex social situations which enslaved and later freed African Americans found themselves in the Edgefield District. Our speakers will inspire the broad public audiences to consider how enslaved Africans learned the pottery trade while in bondage and later used this knowledge as a marketable skill after emancipation. The public audience will be presented this rich history through the multiple disciplines of Art History, Archaeology, History, and Enthographic analogy.

This speaker series is sponsored by the Edgefield County Historical Society, with the generous cooperation of *Joanne T. Rainsford Discovery Center* and the McKissick Museum. This project will contribute to a broad, collaborative project of archaeologists, historians, and members of the local and descendant communities to place such topics of the legacies of African American communities in greater focus within our national memory and heritage. Our speakers will lead audience discussions on considerations of ways to commemorate and convey the humanities lessons of such heritage sites to broad populations of U.S. citizens who visit such sites both tangibly and virtually.
